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Course/specification overview

"A Level Dance is a course which encourages students to develop their creative and intellectual capacity, alongside transferable skills such as team working, communication and problem solving. All of these are sought after skills by higher education and employers and will help them stand out in the workplace whatever their choice of career. This specification reflects both historical and current dance practices, making it more relevant, and inspires a lifelong passion and appreciation for dance". (AQA A Level Introduction)

There are three main elements within the course:

- 1. Performance in a SOLO and as a QUARTET
- 2. Choreograph a group choreography, which lasts for 3-4 minutes, for three, four or five dancers, in response to an externally set task.
- 3. Critical Engagement Understanding of a range of professional dance works, in <u>TWO</u> Set works and TWO Areas of Study.

Component 1: Practical elements

Solo Performance

Performance in a Quartet

Choreography in a group of 3-5 dancers

Component 2: Written exam

The written exam will show detailed knowledge of the following areas and works:

Set Work – Rooster (Christopher Bruce, 1991)

Area of Study – Rambert Dance Company 1966-2002

Set work – Singin' In The Rain (Donen and Kelly, 1952)

Area of Study – American Jazz Dance 1940-1975



Our department expectations

The expectation of the department is to develop 'Thinking dancers' with the ability to use their skills of performance, creativity and appreciation of dance as life-long skills.

The characteristics of the Hayes learner are at the heart of dance. A 'Thinking Dancer' is Independent, Creative, A Team player, A Communicator & Reflective.

Performance and choreographic ability are essential and there is an expectation to build on your skills and widen your ability in a range of styles. This will require independent study and research outside of the lesson environment.

Independence and resilience are essential skills to develop and maintain in the dance department. There are a number of opportunities to experience these skills as a Hayes learner through lessons, independent study, homework, leadership and extra-curricular clubs.

Lessons are both practical and written and there is an expectation to bring appropriate kit and writing equipment to all lessons.

Enthusiasm for the subject is essential – background reading and research are the key to success!
