#### Message from the Head of School



With the recent hot weather making its presence felt across the country, there's been no shortage of sunhats, water bottles and fans around the school. Despite the unusual warmth in classrooms, students and staff have been in good spirits, although the field is looking somewhat less happy and worse for wear.

At the end of last week our students revisited their academic tutoring targets with tutors and other staff on Thursday afternoon. Students will have celebrated success, reflected on challenges and considered ways in which they can develop as learners and young people next academic year. I sincerely hope that they will live by this saying 'If the plan doesn't work, change the plan, not the goal.'

Our Year 10 Geographers have certainly been making the most of the good weather on their recent fieldwork trips to the Isle of Sheppey. Students worked with energy and focus as they explored both coastal processes and human geography topics firsthand. Students returned with excellent data, a healthy dose of sea air and plenty of inspiration for their coursework!

Hot on the heels of the Art Show, our musicians and vocalists took to the stage. The hall was again packed out for our **Summer Music Concert**, where we were treated to a joyful and eclectic mix of performances – from wind band to jazz band and vocal ensembles.



It was also great to see so many of our returning alumni get involved with the choir in what is a time-honoured tradition at our summer event. Well done to all involved!

I am pleased to report that the public examination season has now come to an end and I would like to thank the exams team, invigilators, teaching assistants and pastoral teams for their hard work in recent weeks providing support and encouragement to students, as well as our students for their exceptional conduct.

Best wishes go with our students who are completing their **Silver Duke of Edinburgh expedition** this weekend. I have no doubt they will embrace the weather and terrain with gusto and demonstrate great perseverance and teamwork – not to mention excellent mapreading skills, as they achieve this much sought after award.

Transition has also been high on our agenda this term. Our incoming Year 7 students joined us for their transition day, exploring the site, meeting key staff, and getting a taste of what life at secondary school will be like. We were also delighted to welcome their parents and carers to our Welcome Evening, where the excitement and anticipation for September was clear to see. #### No slow-down in Summer for Drama!

It's been a typically busy time in the Drama Department this summer, but even more so than usual this year. For the first time, Years 10 and 12 have spent the summer terms working on their Component 1 Devised pieces - a major part of their final qualification – rather than in the autumn term of next year.

Re-structuring the courses this way is giving us more time to work in the second year of the course on Component 3 – the written examinations that conclude the courses next summer.



Our Year 13s were given the first few pages of Nick Payne's play Constellations and the style of contemporary physical theatre legends Frantic Assembly as the stimulus for their Component 1 Devised

pieces, which will be performed at the end of September. Both groups are well on the way to creating sophisticated and powerful pieces of theatre that are not afraid to comment on the rather precarious state of the world today!







Year 10 have been devising in the style of the Bertolt Brecht, choosing from a set of Exam Board provided stimulus ranging from Queen's Bohemian Rhapsody to a Mark Twain quote! We've been hugely impressed with their creativity and commitment to this unit and are very excited about seeing their pieces towards the end of term!



Elsewhere, Year 7 have dipped into Philip Ridley's play Sparkleshark as a way into exploring fairy-tale characters for the culmination of a yearlong dive into how to create and

sustain a range of character types, whilst Year 8 are having their eyes opened to the gangland culture of 1950's Croydon as we take a documentary approach to the tragic tale of Derek Bentley and Christopher Craig. Year 9 meanwhile, have been using the techniques of the playwright Mark Wheeler to finish their KS3 Drama Journey by creating their own pieces of Theatre in Education.



Friday 18<sup>th</sup> July sees the birth of a new addition to the summer calendar. From the ashes of Hazefest comes Live On The Lawn, an evening of eclectic music curated by Mr Brett and Mr Gunning, with performances from students of all ages and even a few members of staff. On Wednesday, a group of 40 A Level students visited King's Cross as part of their studies on urban redevelopment. The purpose of the trip was to examine the success of the regeneration project in the area, which aligns with their current scheme of work on regeneration and urban development, and may also inform their Non-Examined Assessment (NEA) projects.

Having previously explored the historical and geographical context of King's Cross in lessons, students welcomed the opportunity to experience the location firsthand. They were able to identify key landmarks, deepen their understanding of the area's heritage, and observe its contemporary functions. Throughout the day, students practised a variety of data collection techniques to evaluate the success, sustainability, and long-term impact of the redevelopment.

You might remember back in December when I ran 100km around Clapham Common in a single day for charity. Well, it turns out I didn't learn my lesson. In fact, I finished that run wondering if I could go even bigger. And now... I'm about to find out.



While most of us are planning a well-earned rest this summer, I've decided that relaxation is overrated. So, I've set myself a new challenge: to run the entire length of the UK.

Starting on the 27th of July, I'll be running from **John O'Groats** (right at the top of Scotland) all the way to **Land's End** (at the very bottom of Cornwall). That's **1,380 kilometres** (860 miles), working our to be roughly **two marathons a day**, every day, for **21 days straight**.

I'll be joined by my best mate Jordan, another Aussie who works in education and also seems to think this is a good idea. We figured if we're going to run ourselves into the ground, we might as well see a bit of the country while we do it. Hence the idea of JOGLE (John O'Groats to Lands' End) was born.

We're once again raising money for **Rays of Sunshine**, an amazing UK charity that grants wishes to seriously ill children. Our goal is to raise over **£10,000** to help fund life-changing experiences and ongoing hospital support for these young people and their families.
