Message from the Head of School



Welcome back to the Summer Term which is packed with a full and bursting agenda of activities and experiences for our young people both inside and outside of the classroom.

It was great to see so many of our Year 11 and 13 students in school for revision sessions

and our Study Hub over the Half Term break as we pass the half-way point of the examinations season. Elsewhere around the school our Year 7 and 9 students have been honing their revision skills and strategies as they have undertaken their own end of year exams; showcasing their learning, knowledge and powers of retrieval in timed conditions. We know how valuable these experiences are (although much shorter in timing) in preparing our young people for their journey ahead.

I was delighted to hear about the exploits of a small contingent of Sixth Form students who completed their Gold Duke of Edinburgh expedition at the start of the Half Term break. Having done my Duke of Edinburgh award a number of years ago mainly navigating the Welsh hills on foot, I am in awe of our students having successfully negotiated their final expedition in a bell boat on the River Thames, they had built themselves. I am always conscious that young people today do not always get the credit and good press they deserve so I was especially delighted to receive the following message from a member of the public:

"Yesterday I had the pleasure of encountering seven of your outstanding students as they made their way down the River Thames. These students were a delight to meet. They were positive, enthusiastic and I was taken by the support they were giving each other and the consideration they were showing to others on the river. These young people are a credit to your school and to their families."



I had the privilege of attending the Year 13 prom on the last day of term in celebration of our student's time with us at Hayes. Whether they had been on a seven or two-year journey, what always strikes me is the genuine togetherness and family feel of the event which we always look on with affection and gratitude. The glamour, glitz, bowties and DJ's were certainly not in short supply as we enjoyed dinner, the dance floor and in time honoured tradition, belted out our own rendition of our Hayes Anthem, 'Proud'. As part of our personal development programme students engage regularly with Wellbeing input and will all be familiar with a programme called Treehouse. This week we have been exploring the impact of us overthinking things, overanalysing situations and the related issue of us being unable to switch off properly. I know I for one will be putting the advice of breaking issues down and quieting the noise around my thinking into action in the next week.

In a similar vein, in what is one of the busiest times in the school calendar, we have this week been celebrating Wellbeing Week with our staff body. This is an opportunity to pause in our hectic day to day schedules and activities and ensure we take time to appreciate colleagues, share a healthy lunch with one another, join in some well-meaning fun (our cornhole competition was certainly highly competitive) and spend time with colleagues from other departments across our large school. 
