## Farewell and thanks from Mr Whittle

Dear students, staff and families,

After 25 unforgettable years at Hayes School, including the last 13 years as Head of School, Principal and Executive Headteacher, the time has come for me to say goodbye.

It's hard to put into words just how much this school community has meant to me. From my first days as a teacher to the immense privilege of leading the school, I've been surrounded by incredible colleagues, supportive families, and above all, inspiring and engaging children and young people.

I can still to this day remember the very thing that attracted me to apply to work at Hayes School in March 2000. The school expressed that '**teachers and staff work hard, students work hard, and students appreciate the teachers' hard work.**' I knew then that I would be joining a community of like-minded people who are ambitious for themselves, others and the school. I firmly believe that this holds true today.

Last week, I was reminded by Miss Thompson of what I had written in my application form about undertaking training in the DofE Award as a trainee teacher and the importance to me of:

- Engaging students in memorable and fun learning
- Educational visits and exchanges
- Raising the achievement of all students, of all abilities

I hope that I delivered on these commitments and promises as a teacher and leader. I have always sought to be a positive role model for our students, encouraging them to be themselves, to have a go at things and to embrace the plethora of opportunities and experiences on offer to them. I have only ever had the highest expectations for students and hope that they would describe me as firm, fair and friendly.

I consider myself immensely fortunate to have benefited from opportunities to grow as a teacher and school leader through



visits to schools in China and Singapore, as well as leading and accompanying school trips across Europe, including to France, Germany and Spain. I have even trodden the boards of the Hayes stage (many, many years ago) and more recently performed alongside students in music concerts. Whilst I have been (and remain) a passionate advocate and supporter for school sport, my own participation and success on the field of play has been far more limited!



Together, we've navigated challenges, celebrated milestones, and built and sustained a school that I believe truly puts care, learning and growth at the heart of everything it does. Getting better has never stopped at Hayes and I have seen improvements in academic outcomes, in the development of pastoral care, in innovative approaches to teaching and learning and in the school's facilities, because of the hard work, vision and commitment of staff and governors.



Among many highlights, seeing the school judged as outstanding in 2011, 2013 and again in 2022 recognised how truly special and unique Hayes School is. These judgements are testament to the quality of provision and impact of the school's work in providing an all-rounded education. I have often used the phrase 'outstanding not perfect' and recognise that I and others may not always get (or have got) things right, for which I apologise. Thank you for continually working with and not against the school and staff as we work together to improve things for your child and every student at the school.

However, for me, the greatest pride comes from seeing what we achieve as a community at Hayes in the way our students grow into kind, confident, and capable young people. That's a testament to the hard work and passion of our staff, the unwavering support of parents and carers, and the vibrant, joyful spirit of our students.

Working closely in and leading two schools within our trust this year has been understandably demanding but has given me a real insight into how similar the schools in our trust are and how much we can learn from and share with each other.



I would like to thank Miss Thompson for her hard work and exceptional commitment to leading the school this year as Head of School. I know she will continue to play a key role in moving the school forward, alongside Mr Hitch (Headteacher) and the Senior Leadership Team in the future.

As I step away from Hayes, I carry with me a heart full of gratitude (and Hayes will always have a place in my heart). It has been an honour and privilege to be a custodian of Hayes School and to serve the Hayes School community over the last 25 years. Thank you for allowing me to be part of your children's journey.

## Year 7 visit to The Observatory Science Centre Royal in Hurstbourne



The students learned about space, stars, and how astronomers make amazing discoveries. Many were amazed by how big the telescope was and how it helps us understand the universe.

During the trip, students also took part in two group challenges. These activities helped them work together as a team. In one challenge, they had to build tall and stable towers using simple materials. In the other, they built "friendship bridges" that could hold their weight. Both tasks encouraged teamwork, creativity, and problem-solving.

Another favourite part of the day was the hands-on exhibit corridor. It was full of entertaining and interactive science tasks. Students could touch, test, and explore different science experiments. Everyone was busy trying out the challenges and learning through play. The Discovery Park was also a hit, with team games and activities that kept everyone active and excited.




At the hydraulics water park, students learned about how water moves and works in machines, while also having lots of fun.

**Ahead of the Summer Holidays – A Message from Bromley Safer Schools Officers**

As we approach the final week of term, Bromley Safer Schools Officers would like to share the following advice with students and their families.

Each year, during the last week of term, we tend to see a rise in crime, disorder, and anti-social behaviour—particularly in high street areas across the borough. Please be aware that if you attend these locations and become involved in any form of disorder, you could face serious consequences, including arrest. Police will also work closely with schools to identify those involved, and individuals will be held accountable for their actions. Involvement in criminal behaviour could negatively impact your summer holiday and your future.

We are also seeing a growing concern around vaping in schools. It is illegal for anyone under the age of 18 to purchase or possess vapes containing nicotine. These products can be harmful to your health, and some imported vapes do not meet EU safety standards. Safer Schools Officers are working in partnership with the local authority to tackle the illegal sale and distribution of vapes.

Finally, while robbery offences across Bromley have decreased thanks to proactive policing and strong partnership work, we urge you not to become complacent over the summer.

Please remember the key principles for staying safe:

- Keep valuables out of sight and out of mind
- Minimise the number of items you carry with you in public
- Be aware of your surroundings
- Plan your routes in advance

Mobile phones continue to be the most targeted item in robberies.
