

MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Reflecting on the opportunities a new school year presents us with, I always return to school in September with a new set of promises and commitments to myself and others. You could say that I set a new year's resolution in September as well as January and I encourage our students to do the same. Over the last two weeks we have been asking students to look back at last year and to consider the year ahead. This is an opportunity for them to reflect on what they were most proud of last year, to write their story for the year ahead and make their own commitments (or resolutions).

What activities do you plan to be involved in? What do you want to achieve?

What effective learning routines have you developed/will you develop to support your progress and success in school?

Are there any habits you need to change or adopt?

How will teachers know this year has been successful for you?

I encourage you to read and discuss your child's responses in their Y7-11 Learner Handbook on page 21. You are also invited to make any optional comments. We are planning to re-introduce an Academic Tutoring Day on Friday 6th October to follow up on this and hold 1:1 conversations with students during the day. More details of this will be sent early next week.

In my start of term assemblies, I shared our school vision and values and invited students to reflect on their own personal vision and values. You can read a Year 11 student's account of my assembly in this edition of the newsletter.

Based on your responses to our Parent Survey last year, we acknowledged that we could do more to make you aware of what your child/children will learn during the year. All students in Years 7-11 have been issued with a Learner Handbook which includes the learning journey from Year 7-13 for each subject and this will provide you with an overview of the key knowledge students will be covering in lessons. Additional subject specific pages may support homework and independent learning. Please familiarise yourself with your child's learner handbook, which should be brought to school every day as part of their equipment.

If your own experiences as parents are similar to those of us in school, we recognise the need to model the behaviours we expect of students, to be explicit, consistent and explain the reasons for this. I know this is especially true of very young children who need behaviours to be taught and retaught. I am clear that all our students have the right to learn in classrooms which are free from disruption and to feel safe, happy and successful in school. This year, our focus will be on supporting students to be ready, responsible and respectful. Understandably our immediate attention is focussed on ensuring our students are ready for school and ready to learn.

A real highlight for me over the last two weeks has been speaking with new Year 7 and 12 students who have recently joined the school. I am also enjoying teaching a new Year 7 class for the first time in over 10 years (They are somewhat more enthusiastic than the Year 10 and 11 students I have taught in recent years!)

I look forward to meeting you at a number of the events taking place this term and thank you for the continued support you provide to the school and my colleagues.

I sincerely hope that this year is successful and enjoyable for your child and know that by working together we can support them to be 'the best version of themselves'

HKVA Review: Summer 2023


The summer edition of the HVA Review has now been published and is available to read online on the Hayes (Kent) Village Association website:

Year 11 Assembly Student Review

During the first week back, Mr Whittle delivered an assembly to all year groups. For us Year 11's, the assembly started with a video montage of Year 11 and Year 13 exam results. The achievements were inspiring and something I would like to think my year group can do at the end of the year as well. The focus of the assembly then moved onto visions and values. Mr Whittle discussed the importance of identity and vision and looked at the vision and motto of the company Apple. We looked at how their consistency and continuity matches their products and the way they work every day. Mr Whittle then moved onto the school's motto, vision and ethos, and looked at how this works in Hayes every day, but more importantly, how us as students are required to demonstrate this, not only in school but also in the local community. The school's motto is "Excellence through Endeavour" and means that, as students we like to demonstrate this by working hard every day and applying ourselves in lessons and around the school. The school's vision includes having uncompromising aspirations for all students and Mr Whittle emphasised the idea that all students can achieve and excel alongside the idea that none of us have a ceiling on our outcomes if we work hard and apply ourselves. He explained how "just being present" is not enough but that we need to engage with our learning actively. The Hayes Way is something that plays a very active part of day to day life here at Hayes. It helps to steer students towards improving as people as opposed to only focusing on classes and subjects. The Hayes Way is something that is constantly referred to by teachers, and Mr Whittle continued to touch on this in his assembly, identifying some key characteristics of what a Hayes Student is and what it means to be part of our school community.

Personally, it was really enjoyable to have the Principal come in and host an assembly at the start of the year, it helps to reiterate what our school stands for and what Mr Whittle expects from us as students of Hayes School.

Results ROUND UP

2023

Well done and congratulations to all our students who sat Level 1, 2 and 3 examinations this summer in either A-Level, AS, GCSE or Vocational qualifications. We cannot underestimate the achievements of all of our students, and it is testament to the hard work and energies of staff, students and the valuable support from parents and carers that our students are once again celebrating another set of very good exam results.

We are extremely proud that over 82% of our Year 11 students achieved a 4+ in both English and Maths with 65% achieving a Grade 5+ in the same measure. There were again some fantastic performances at the higher grades, with approximately 1 in 3 of our Year 11 students achieving Grades 7-9. Nearly 70% of our students achieved Grades 5-9 across all of their subjects, ensuring students secured entry onto Level 3 courses, apprenticeships and into their chosen further education.

The picture at A-Level and Level 3 was also pleasing with over half of all grades at an A*-B (in line with the National Average) and 80% of all grades at A*-C. At the highest level of achievement, 20% of grades for our Year 13 cohort were a Grade A*-A. Vocational results were again very positive, with nearly 50% of all grades attained at a Distinction or Distinction*. The breadth of courses on offer within Hayes Sixth Form continues to ensure students have access to a variety of qualifications that best suit their individual aptitudes and future aspirations.


It is no surprise given these successes in Year 13 that 90% of university applicants secured a place at their first-choice university, with popular courses for degree studies being in Accounting, Business, Economics and Finance, and Mathematics and Science (including Medicine). These results have also opened doors to highly sought-after higher-level apprenticeships at big name firms and companies for increasing numbers of students, as well as full time employment for others.

We wish every student continued success as they embark on the next phase of their journey and look forward to sharing in, or hearing of, their exciting new ventures and achievements.














Free School Meals applications

HOW TO APPLY

Application forms are available from Bromley schools, or you can apply here.

If you have any questions about this issue, please visit the Bromley Information page (heres/bromley.sch.uk. (Assistant Principal) DHH@hayes.bromley.sch.uk.

Your child may be able to get free school meals if you receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit), with an annual gross income of no more than £16,190 (as assessed by HMRC).
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Universal Credit - with a net annual household income of £7,400 a year or less (after tax and not including any benefits you get).

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get free school meals. Finally, your child may also get free school meals if you get any of these benefits and your child is both:

Younger than the compulsory age for starting school

In full-time education

If you do not qualify for most benefits (known as having 'no recourse to public funds'), your child may still be eligible for free school meals.

Vapes and E-Cigarettes: Information for Parents

I am sure that you will have been aware of the information in the news in recent months surrounding the growing number of young people nationally who have either tried vaping or are regular users of vapes. Action on Smoking and Health (ASH) estimate that just over 20% of 11-17 year olds in 2023 have tried vaping and the number of young people who define themselves as regular 'vapers' are now double the number of child smokers. Whilst for many they are seen as being safer, in some respects, than cigarettes, the medium and long term effects are simply unknown.

In support of parents and carers who may be concerned about their child possibly vaping or who simply want to know more about it, please find a resource for parents here which was put together by Action for Children. Also available here is a short webinar from Bromley Changes, shared in a newsletter last year, which contains useful information on the subject.

YEAR 12 PSYCHOLOGY FIELD TRIP

Bethlem Museum of the Mind

On Tuesday the 12th of September Year 13 Psychology students had the opportunity to visit Bethlem Museum of the Mind. When we arrived, we were greeted by members of staff and sat to have our first talk. An archivist for Bethlem first talked to us about the history of the mental hospital, which was very interesting. It started off in London in 1247, making it Europe's oldest mental hospital. We discussed the two sites originally in London, the second one being the site of what is now the Imperial War Museum. This is something I never knew. He talked about how people were treated within the hospital which was very shocking. Often, patients were in chains and restricted, left naked on a bed of straw. This reminds you of how animals are treated. Patients had blood drawn from their heads, were forced to throw up and other horrific acts which they believed would draw out the 'disease' from inside them. As well as this, visitors could pay to see and observe the hospital, like visitors at a zoo. Another interesting fact we learnt is that the people of London used to call it 'Bedlam' (meaning chaos) even though this was not the hospital's official name. This encapsulates the attitude that the public had towards those with mental health problems. When Bethlem moved to its current location in Beckenham with lots of nature, the aim was for patients to live a more ideal life to help them get better. Therefore, at this new location in the early 20th century, they were given pets, the hospital held regular dances, encouraged sports etc. This change of heart about how we should treat the mentally ill actually came about due to King George suffering with mental issues. It became more accepted.

Next, we had a session interpreting a painting called 'The Maze' by William Kurelek who was a patient at Bethlem being treated for depression. He struggled to open up to his doctors so painted. His painting is of a skull cut in half and inside are many compartments representing separate struggles in his life. In the centre is a rat curled up in a ball. This was representing that the rat (metaphorically William himself) was stuck in the maze of his own head and was too physically exhausted to keep trying. It was really amazing to see how people can present their thought processes and experiences through artwork so clearly. After this we were given a chance to eat lunch and look around the grounds, which were full of beautiful trees and nature. There was a nice atmosphere around the site. We then had the opportunity to look around the permanent and temporary exhibits at the museum which included more paintings, sculptures and a series of objects used in the mental hospital. One thing that I found very interesting was a part of the padded wall used in a 'quiet room' in a mid-20th century hospital. Overall, the trip gave me a true insight into how attitudes towards mental illness have changed and come such a long way.


No consumption of nuts or nut-based products in school (e.g. almonds, walnuts, pecans, cashews, pistachios, peanuts, peanut butter etc.)

Students are reminded to be vigilant when travelling to and from school.

- Pay attention when crossing roads (do not use your mobile phone)
- Be aware when and to report concerns or suspicious behaviour to an adult (stranger danger)
- · Keep valuables out of sight

Please can I urge all parents/carers to respect the school entrance markings outside school on West Common Road during the hours of operation (before and after school). We also politely ask that vehicles are not parked or stopped where they might cause an obstruction to other road users or where they might obscure visibility for students when crossing the road or where they may prevent students from having a safe place to cross.

You MUST NOT wait or park on yellow lines during the times of operation shown on nearby time plates (or zone entry signs if in a Controlled Parking Zone) – see 'Traffic signs' and 'Road markings'. Double yellow lines indicate a prohibition of waiting at any time even if there are no upright signs. You MUST NOT wait or park, or stop to set down and pick up passengers, on school entrance markings (see 'Road markings') when upright signs indicate a prohibition of stopping. The Highway Code, Rule 238.



Take care when crossing the roads as you leave school. Find the safest place to cross with good visibility and wait to cross safely.
