Improvements made this term:

Celebrating Success: Rewards and Recognition

We've increased rewards and recognition this term through golden tickets and more frequent celebration assemblies. It's been a pleasure to publicly recognise the effort, attitude, and achievement of our amazing Hayes students.

Increased focus on Careers Education

We have stepped up our work on careers. Just this week our Year 13 students took part in mock interviews with employers, gaining invaluable experience as they prepare for their next steps. Their professionalism and confidence was impressive, and we are grateful to the employers who supported this initiative. We also launched our new careers curriculum this term, designed to provide

structured guidance, aspiration, and practical skills from an early stage—strengthening our commitment to preparing every student for life beyond Haves.

Strengthening Support for Year 11

We've expanded subject-specific support classes after school and introduced new exam stands to ensure students have easy access to practice papers. These changes are already helping Year 11 build confidence and consistency ahead of their summer exams.

Students Supporting Students

Our new attendance mentoring programme pairs Sixth Form students with younger peers, reinforcing the strength of our community and the positive role modelling of our older students. Sixth formers are also excelling as Reading Mentors and Maths Mentors—making a real difference.

Outstanding Enrichment

We've built on our reputation for great extra-curricula opportunities. Hayes students have taken part in **128 fixtures** this year, including basketball, football, rugby, netball, and trampolining. They've also enjoyed **31 trips**, from Ypres to Vienna—broadening horizons and creating unforgettable memories.

Break and lunch improvements

After a review of our canteen procedures we've introduced a much improved one-way system in the restaurant. Students now get their food much quicker and can enjoy their social time for longer. New volleyball and netball equipment has also made organised play an even more prominent feature of break and lunch.

Opening Doors to Oxbridge

We have continued our focus on great destinations

- last year 80% of Hayes students went to university, and a number of others started prestigious degree

apprenticehips. We are incredibly proud that **14 students** have already secured Oxbridge interviews this term—a remarkable achievement that reflects both the ambition and the dedication of our staff and students.

We believe these values truly reflect our community, and we warmly welcome feedback from parents as we move towards their formal introduction after Christmas.






1959 - The invention of the integrated circuit by Jack Kilby and Robert Noyce. This is what we think of today when we think of electronics. It paved the way for the information age.









Sixth Form Sporting Success: Girls Leading the Way



We are thrilled to recognise the recent outstanding sporting achievements of two of our Sixth Form students, showing that dedication and talent are alive and well across a range of sports.

Paige P made an impressive senior debut at the prestigious Lakeside World Darts Championship, stepping up to compete against some of the best players in the world. At just 17, Paige transitioned from youth success into the senior ranks with confidence and composure. In her opening match on the iconic Lakeside stage, she secured a convincing 2–0 victory over Swiss opponent Lisa Zollikofer, demonstrating strong scoring, focus and maturity beyond her years.

Paige's tournament run came to an end following a closely contested match against Sophie McKinlay. Despite the narrow 2–1 defeat, Paige delivered an eye-catching performance, including hitting a 180 and taking early control of the match. Her debut was more than a learning experience — it was a clear statement of her ability to compete at a senior level and build on her success as the reigning Girls' World Champion.

The achievement of Nia was equally impressive, who represented Wales U18 in water polo at the BMC Cup in Dunfermline on 6th and 7th December. The Welsh U18 water polo team faced a highly experienced Scotland side and, although the matches did not result in victory, the weekend proved to be an invaluable experience. It marked the first international competition for the Welsh squad, offering important exposure to the demands of international-level water polo.

Nia's performances throughout the tournament were exceptional, and she consistently stood out in both attack and defence. In recognition of her impact in the pool, she was nominated by the Wales coaches as Player of the Tournament, a remarkable individual honour at international level.

This competition represents the first stage of Wales' international water polo journey, with the team now setting their sights on future opportunities, including a potential appearance at the Commonwealth Youth Games in Malta in 2027

Both Paige and Nia exemplify the determination, resilience and sporting excellence of our Sixth Form students. Their achievements across very different sports highlight the breadth of talent within the school and serve as an inspiration to younger students.



Our A Level DT trip to the MINI Plant in Oxford was really fun. We got to see how the cars are made and watched the robots working together like clockwork. The best part was definitely FIDO, the robot dog (he was so cute and actually helped with assembly). I liked seeing how all the different processes fit together and how they use just-intime manufacturing and a lot of automation. We toured areas like Body in White for example, wearing high-vis jackets and headphones too, so we could still hear our tour guide above the machines. Me, Ella and Chloe even got to sit in a brand-new MINI, which was a nice little bit.

Last week, I had the great opportunity to visit an industrial manufacturing plant. We were given a tour of two buildings on how MINIs are made from start to finish. It was a great experience to see how automated the process is and how modern manufacturing methods work. The first building was all about the frame and constructing the chassis. Each robot had a specific job that it would consistently repeat with zero tolerance for error. At 22 football pitches long and wide, you can tell how many robots they require for absolute precision. As we moved along, it started to come to life and eventually it was ready for some wheels and a paint job.

The second building was smaller but many more people worked here - 650 compared to only 105 in the first. We watched videos of how they send the frames through tanks of paints, liquids and chemicals and then eventually, it was ready to be sprayed. Paint is spread at 21 microns thick (thinner than a human hair) in a completely sealed room until it comes out the other side shiny and fresh. Coming on to the final stretch, all the things we associate with cars are installed. Wheels, dash, engine – all the things that make it move. Finally, we enjoyed the fruits of.. well, it was their labour but we enjoyed it nonetheless, to see the cars roll off the production line at a total time of 22 hours.

For me, it was an amazing experience as this is a field I would like to step into in the future, and has also really helped towards the curriculum.


At its fundament, this book is about getting the opportunity to be better, and yearning for a different life, something we all want and can relate to. Pip is a deeply ambitious person who wants so much, and gets the chance to achieve this, but he is also a flawed character who didn't understand the value of what he had when it was his. His wealth made him lose sight of what was really important - but that doesn't make him a bad person, just flawed. Just human.

This book criticises, not so subtlety, class-based society and examines what it means to be a 'gentleman' in Victorian London, where social class was of utmost importance.
