A Positive Start to the Term & Our New School Values

It has been a real pleasure to welcome students back this January. They have returned exceptionally well, with a calm, focused and positive attitude to learning. This half term has also seen the launch of our new school values with students: **Be Kind, Show Up, Own It, and Stronger Together**. It has been wonderful to see these values already coming to life in classrooms, corridors and co-curricular activities across the school.

Celebrating Student Experiences

There has been a real buzz around the site, with lots of fantastic events taking place. A particular highlight was for our students who represented the school in football and were fortunate enough to see, and have photographs with, the FA Cup. I later discovered it is valued at around £1 million, so I was relieved it made it back safely!

Mobile Phones – A Reminder

You may be aware that new Department for Education guidance on mobile phones has recently been published, with further updates expected in the coming months. I am watching this closely to understand any implications for schools. In the meantime, I would like to remind families that we operate an *out-of-sight, gate-to-gate* mobile phone policy. While I understand that some parents want their child to be contactable on the journey to and from school, we strongly believe that the school day should be a time for students to learn, connect and enjoy each other's company without distraction, a clear example of *showing up* fully for learning. We do confiscate mobile phones each time they are seen and issue detentions for repeated confiscations.

First Give & Student Leadership

Year 9 students have been producing some outstanding First Give projects, demonstrating creativity, teamwork and social responsibility. I particularly enjoyed the "Splat the Teacher" event — even if it did involve me being hit in the face with a wet sponge! Today brings "Beat the Keeper", and I am fully expecting a degree of humiliation. These moments not only really capture what it means to *be kind* and *stronger together* as a community but also raise money for charity.

Sporting Success

Working in Partnership with Parents

Trips, Enrichment & Sixth Form Mentoring

Psychology

In the Spotlight



On Tuesday the 16th of December Year 13 Psychology students visited Bethlem Royal Hospital to find out about the hospital's history and approach to treating mental health conditions. It was interesting to grasp what living in a mental institution was like through different time periods, specifically what an individual might experience living in Bethlem itself.



We learnt about how the hospital moved from Liverpool Street to Moorfields and then to its present site in Beckenham and the reasons for these moves (primarily due to the recognition that greener spaces are good for our mental health). As well as this, we considered how diagnosis has changed over time. In the 1500's, you could only be admitted to Bethlem for being in either a 'Raving' or 'Melancholy' state, but in the present day, there are nearly 300 recognised mental illnesses in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual. Those two diagnoses from the 1500s are represented through two huge statues, which have stayed with the hospital as it has moved location until today. In addition, we analysed the artwork 'The Maze' produced by William Kurelek, a patient of the hospital who became a well-known artist. We interpreted the conflicts he may have been experiencing through the images he presented in the painting and learnt a lot about his life experiences from this in-depth look into his work. Finally, we also had chance to look around the museum, listening to transcripts of people talking about what mental illness means to them, viewing artwork that patients have created, and seeing historical artifacts such as restraints and treatment machines.

In the Spotlight



From the 7th to the 10th of January, Hayes A-Level German students along with three students from one of Trust schools, Langley Park Girls, went to Germany's capital city of Berlin. Although it was very cold with snow on the ground, reaching lows of minus 10 degrees, students found themselves enjoying all aspects of the trip, leaving no room for boredom!



We arrived in Berlin at about 19:00, with plenty of people tired from the flight, and bought ourselves dinner from a nearby restaurant, as an easy start to the busy trip ahead of us. We were warmly welcomed into the hotel "MEININGER Hotel Berlin Alexanderplatz" and settled into our rooms.



On Thursday, we ventured upon a walking tour around the city. The excursion with our guide, Chris, was well-received, and everyone learnt something historical about the post-Nazi era of Germany, such as the famous escape plans from East Berlin into West Berlin. We finished the tour at Checkpoint Charlie and grabbed a bite to eat. After some time in the KulturKaufhaus exploring all sorts of books, instruments and records, we headed to a chocolate workshop at Rittersport. This also involved a few facts about the chocolate making process, and how the company of Rittersport came to be, along with two bars of hand made chocolate per person! Afterwards, we visited the Reichstag, in which we read about the historical context around the building and parliament itself. We enjoyed an incredible Italian meal at a local spot; the day was then finished with interactive games — everyone was so competitive!



After a later start on Friday at 09:00, which was well-needed, we visited the former Stasi prison - Hohenschönhausen. During the Cold War, this was one of the many places where the Stasi would send their political enemies. As censorship was prominent, opposing the regime was seen as a crime, which meant many innocent people were interrogated and held behind those prison walls. In the afternoon, we then looked around the DDR (German Democratic Republic) museum, gaining an insight into the lives of those living in the country up until 1989. Our day came to an end, as we ate in a famous German restaurant—Lemke Hackescher Markt – and watched the film 'Rental Family' in a little arthouse cinema. An interesting mash up of German, Japanese and English!



After a bonus trip up the TV tower at Alexanderplatz on Saturday morning for fantastic views in the crisp morning, we set out in groups around the Berlin Mall to explore and buy any wanted items. Even more exciting, it had a huge slide in the middle! We enjoyed our free time, allowing us to be able to shop & eat lunch without worry. With nearly all euros spent, we returned back to the hotel, to take our suitcases and fly back to England.

On Tuesday evening, our Year 11 GCSE students had the chance to see *The Play That Goes Wrong* at the Duchess Theatre in London as part of their upcoming written exam – an evening filled with laughter, surprises, and plenty of falling scenery!

The production follows the fictional 'Cornley Polytechnic Drama Society' as they attempt to stage a murder mystery. Unfortunately for them (and fortunately for the audience), absolutely everything that can go wrong...does. From missing props to collapsing set pieces, it's a brilliantly staged disaster that keeps the audience laughing throughout.

Year 8 Students Inspired by Guest Speaker



On Tuesday, Year 8 students had the privilege of hearing from an inspiring guest speaker, Emma Flaxman, who shared her fascinating career journey in media, marketing and advertising. Emma worked as a Brand Marketer for Channel 4 and gave students an engaging insight into how she arrived at her role.

Emma spoke about the variety of pathways available within the industry, including apprenticeship schemes within organisations, and the differences between working in-house for a brand and working at an agency. She explained how agency roles can offer opportunities to try a wide range of areas such as planning, finance, design and technology. As brands move in and out of agencies, employees gain experience working on different styles and projects, helping them to build a broad skill set.

Students also learned about the essential skills needed to succeed in the media and marketing world. Emma highlighted problem solving, teamwork, working under pressure and the ability to multitask "like a robot" as key strengths. However, she emphasised that the most important skill of all is curiosity. As Emma explained, careers do not start with a job title – they start with curiosity.

Her final message was particularly reassuring for students: at Year 8, there is no need to have everything figured out. Emma encouraged students to embrace their "accidental career paths", reminding them that even jobs they may not enjoy can be valuable, as they help reveal what they do not want in the future.

The talk was both motivating and thought-provoking, leaving students inspired to stay curious and open-minded about their futures.





THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD

We were delighted to welcome Ben Bullen Adventures to school for our recent Duke of Edinburgh's Award training day, which saw 180 students fully immersed in the skills needed for their upcoming expeditions. Throughout the day, students pitched tents, learned how to use expedition stoves safely, planned menus, practised basic first aid, packed rucksacks efficiently, and began plotting their expedition routes. The sessions were practical, engaging and gave students a real sense of what lies ahead.

We were extremely proud of how our students represented Hayes School, working positively with the external instructors and approaching each task with enthusiasm and maturity. The day offered a valuable opportunity to build confidence and independence, while giving students a strong foundation for their DofE expeditions ahead.

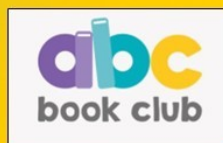

Having a New Year clear-out? We'd love your pre-loved children's books!

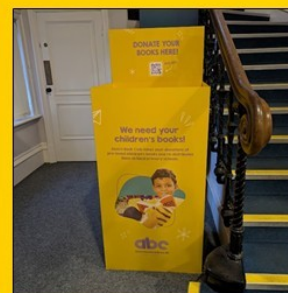
