MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

It seems hard to remember a life before Zoom and Microsoft Teams, which enable us to collaborate and so many to enjoy more flexible home working.

The opportunities afforded by this technology have been realised this week in school (post lockdown) as we came together with teachers and leaders from 23 other schools to hear about the science of memory and the implications for teaching and supporting students. Faceto-face and online meetings have facilitated various collaborations this week between the Headteachers and leaders within our trust and I was meeting with and working with teachers and leaders from London, Leicester and Merthyr Tydfil on Wednesday evening via Zoom.

More excitingly, this technology was put to great use this week for our house assemblies. Broadcasting from the main hall to the multi-purpose hall, students from Years 7-13 came together for house assemblies to celebrate the winners of the 'Hayes Pound,' redeemable against a number of in-school rewards, and to hear about upcoming house competitions (a number of which are advertised in this newsletter). Mr Brett has even been able to find some relevant music linked to each house and has challenged students to design a house logo and decide on a house anthem.

Applications for Hayes Sixth Form have closed and we have received a record number of applications, with our Year 11 students selecting their chosen courses for continuation into Year 12. We will be in contact with Year 11 students and applicants from other schools within the next few weeks.

The Hayes Herald, our student newsletter celebrated its one year anniversary, which is an incredible achievement and is testament to the creativity and commitment of

our students. It highlights their interests, views and perspectives and knowledge and understanding of current affairs and issues affecting young people and wider society. I am so immensely proud of this and look forward to seeing this become a legacy passed down to new generations of students in the coming years.

A new project for Year 9 is making a free-standing clock using Polymers and timbers inspired by the **Memphis Design** Movement. Here is a final product designed and made by Isla Sutherland. We love the bold geometric shapes in this design and the clever use of colour, pattern and symmetry. Great work!

Students design and make a mould for making their own bar that promotes ethical fair trade chocolate bars using the laser cutter and vacuum former machine. Pewter is heated up and poured in the die and left to cool resulting in these wonderful, detailed designs. Do you want to be part of the world's largest garden wildlife survey?

The RSPB Big Garden Bird Watch is happening this weekend (26th - 29th January2024)



It takes 1 hour of your time to observe in your outdoor space (e.g. garden/ park). There is an identification chart you can download. You then need to submit your results online.



Last year 9.1 million birds were counted with House Sparrows taking the top spot. This survey helps the RSPB understand how garden birds are faring. They are concerned as in the last 60 years there has been a serious decline in birds in UK skies- 38 million birds!

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Senior Bookclub

His Dark Materials By Phillip Pullman Review by Ben Cottrell, Lucas Peters and Zac Scott

The Senior Bookclub has been comparing the books with the TV show and the movie The Golden Compass (adaptation of The Northern Lights – book one of the series).

His Dark Materials (TV Show)

Synopsis

The show follows the orphan Lyra as she searches for a missing friend and discovers a kidnapping plot related to an invisible cosmic substance called Dust.

The series remains faithful to the book but does have a few minor changes. Although they do not affect the story too much, they are noticeable to big fans of the books

The first book Northern Lights begins with Lyra already in Oxford, but in the BBC show, we see how Lyra came to be at Oxford in the first place. Then there are a few differences when it comes to characters. Roger, for example, is not an orphan in the books, even though he is in the series. Similarly, the scene where we get introduced to the Gyptians, through a sort of coming-of-age ceremony, does not take place in the books.

There is also more exposure to the Gyptians in the series, as well as minor changes with Mrs Coulter's daemon travelling through secret passages. Other differences include the fact that Lord Boreal is more prominent than in the books, also we do not get as much detail on Mrs Coulter as we do in the books.





The Golden Compass (Movie)

The differences:

 The deaths of certain characters were removed to make the movie more child friendly

 The ending: the movie ends with Lyra and Roger flying away with Lee Scoresby and Lorek Byrnison - however the book continues for another few chapters.

- Some of the order of the scenes has changed.

– The Magisterium is more sinister in the movie-they are the bad guys. It is a much greyer area in the books. The same is true with "the gobblers".

One character from the second book is added to the movie, to provide a platform for what would have been the complete series. Two of the children are combined into one character and the name of the king of the bears was changed.
The magic: in the movie a large amount of the magic has

been taken out removing the very essence of the story.

The similarities:

- The location, and the way the college is set up.
- The importance of the daemons.

 The groups of characters: the gyptians, the panserbørne (the ice bears), and the witches for instance, are all there and just as important.

 How the other characters relate to Lyra, which evolves over the course of the series and is especially important.

elevate education

The Elevate Education organisation is an innovative time management programme to help students manage their revision in an easy and effective way. What I found most helpful about Elevate was how it catered for teenagers and how busy their lives are, which included putting the fun stuff first. As well as this, they make sure that students get a deeper understanding of how to revise in the most effective way, and also conquering what might hinder our revision, and how to deal with these problems, which can often seem too massive to deal with alone.

The beginning of the session involved identifying our tasks and what our non-negotiable tasks are in our personal timetables. After this, we discussed revision timetables, and how they must be manageable and achievable for your own personal use, especially with the incorporation of homework in our schedules as well. One of the most interesting parts of the talk was the debate about the importance of required tasks (homework) and non-required tasks (independent revision) - instead of prioritising our homework, we were advised to start with our non-required tasks, as it engages our brain more and means that overall, our revision will be more productive. Another particularly useful method was the use of study groups: having 4 people in a group who revise separately and then come together to share their ideas. This was quite a new strategy for students, and it is such an appealing idea as you get to collaborate and work as a team / with friends, whilst also doing really effective independent revision. Finally, we discussed procrastination and motivation - how to overcome distractions such as mobile phones and the amount of work we feel we have to do. We broke this down into different sections and it really helped us feel that revision was more achievable than it may seem.

Overall, the session has been very beneficial to our outlook on revision and how to approach it from a positive angle. A great factor was the use of young speakers: this made the whole session more relatable and seem like a goal that is possible - so many others have benefitted from this method of revising strategically, and really thinking about how our brains work. I think Elevate is an amazing programme and I hope we continue to use it more in these coming months to really hone our revision technique as well as looking after our mental health within what could normally be quite a stressful time.

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
