Dear Parents and Carers,

What an incredible start to the academic year it has been. I want to begin by thanking you all for the warm welcome I've received—your kindness, encouragement, and support have been truly humbling. It's already clear to me that Hayes is a very special place, and I feel privileged to be part of such a vibrant and caring community. A special shout out to Thomas in Year 12 for being the first student to come up to me and introduce himself and ask how my day was.

In my first assemblies with students, I shared why I became a headteacher: because I believe schools should be places where young people find moments of joy in the things they are passionate about. That belief is already being brought to life here—our amazing staff have launched over 120 clubs, and an incredible 620 students have already signed up. That's the Hayes spirit in action.

The energy and ambition of our students is inspiring. Year 13 are already heading out next week on a Geography field trip, and our rugby team have kicked off the season with a fixture against none other than rugby giants Campion School. We're also celebrating the fantastic destinations of our recent leavers: 77% are heading to university, with others securing prestigious degree apprenticeships, and five students taking up places at Oxford and Cambridge.

Our Festival of Sport this week was another highlight—over 160 Year 7 students took part in taster sessions in rugby, football, and more, led by our brilliant PE team. It was a joy to see so many students trying something new and having fun.

We were also proud to see Hayes recognised in the media as **Bromley's most popular school**—a testament to the hard work of our staff, the ambition of our students, and the trust you place in us.

There's so much more to come this term, and I look forward to sharing it with you.

We had a fantastic first week with lots of students coming along to our clubs. If you didn't make it this week, it's no problem at all - come along next week!








Music Department trips in July 2025

International Literacy Day 2025

On Monday 8th September, students were asked to read something digitally rather than on paper. This is because the focus of International Literacy Day this year was '"Promoting literacy in the digital era." The UNESCO website explains this approach as follows:



Digitalisation has been changing ways in which we learn, live, work and socialise, in both positive and negative ways, depending on how we engage with it. While digital tools can help expand learning opportunities for marginalised groups, including 739 million young people and adults who lack basic literacy skills, this digital shift also risks creating double marginalisation

 exclusion not only from traditional literacy learning but also from the benefits of the digital age. Digitalisation also raises other concerns, including privacy issues, privacy, digital surveillance, reinforced biases, ethics, the risk of passive consumption, and environmental impacts.

Literacy is a key for making these transformations inclusive, relevant and meaningful. Beyond reading and writing on paper, literacy in the digital era enables people to access, understand, evaluate, create, communicate and engage with digital content safely and appropriately. Literacy is also central for fostering critical thinking, discerning credible information and navigating complex information environments.

At Hayes School, we run fortnightly sessions in the Library for Year 7 and Year 8 to help students learn to research both in physical books and from online resources, teaching them

how to assess the credibility of the websites they use. We ask students to look beyond the Al summary at the top and delve into resources in a more meaningful way.

We can't wait to see them join the rest of the school at clubs when they start on **15th September**. If the Festival is anything to go by, we're in for a brilliant year of sport ahead.



Jack Green Talk to Year 12 on their First Day at Hayes Sixth Form

On their very first day in the Sixth Form, Hayes students were treated to an inspiring and thought-provoking talk from Jack Green, former Team GB 400m hurdler and Olympian. Jack's journey – from the bright lights of the London 2012 Games to his work today as a motivational speaker and mental health advocate – provided the perfect message to launch our new Year 12 cohort into their Sixth Form journey.

Jack spoke openly about his career at the highest level of sport, including the intense pressure of competing in an Olympic semi-final in front of a home crowd. He reflected on the challenges he faced both on and off the track, particularly with his mental health, and how he learned to shift his perspective. His honesty resonated with students, showing that even those who seem to have it all can struggle and that asking for help is a sign of strength, not weakness.

One of Jack's central messages was about "controlling the controllable." He described how, in sport and in life, external pressures – the crowd, the occasion, or the environment – can be overwhelming. What truly matters, however, is the effort we bring and the attitude we choose. In referencing his fall in the London 2012 semi-final, Jack explained that setbacks do not define us; rather, it is how we respond that shapes who we are.

For our Year 12 students, these lessons could not be more timely. Sixth Form is a fresh start, full of opportunity, but it also brings new challenges: greater independence, higher academic demands, and the pressure of future decisions. Jack's emphasis on giving consistent

effort, focusing on what can be controlled, and not letting stress detract from performance was a powerful reminder that resilience and mindset are just as important as hard work.

As they embark on their two-year journey through Key Stage 5, our students have been encouraged to see their Sixth Form experience not simply as a test of exams and results, but as an opportunity to grow in confidence, to take risks, and to discover their own pathways to success. Jack's talk set the tone beautifully: that challenges will come, but with the right outlook and determination, they can be overcome.

We are grateful to Jack for sharing his story with such honesty and energy, and we look forward to seeing Year 12 carry these lessons forward as they begin an exciting new chapter at Hayes.
