#### Jacob's Political Deep Dive Britain, the 19<sup>th</sup> Century Powerhouse that's past its time?

Many would argue that over the past decade, Britain has been in steady decline, Brexit left the nations of the UK divided, our economy's growth has been slowing, our military has been slowly declining and our influence on the global stage has been diminishing. So, what exactly are the problems? Has Britain really had its time?

According to Statista, a major opinion collecting organisation in the UK, only one third of Brits now feel that it was right to leave the EU, whereas 54% now regret the decision. This is for a number of reasons. Since the UK left the EU, the pound has lost much of its value against the Euro – 15% from the day of the vote to the day of the results alone. This has made spending outside the country much more expensive. Additionally, the cost of importing goods has gone up meaning so has the cost of buying the goods – the London School of Economics estimated that it added £6 billion to household shopping bills in the first two years of Brexit alone. However, some argue that there have been merits to Brexit such as the fact it allowed us to have a faster vaccine roll out but some say it wasn't fair not to share out the vaccines. Finally, Brexit has had an impact on the strength of the **United** Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

Since the UK left the EU, the strength of the Union has been questioned and the effect on Scotland has been massive. Since the results of the referendum, the Scottish Nationalist Party (SNP), who are in power in Scotland, have been calling for an independence referendum, as the majority of Scots wanted to remain in the EU. This has caused major division as polls suggests that a small majority of Scots would like to leave the UK and become an independent country. Neither the government, nor the Labour party (currently the opposition party) would allow another referendum and the UK government are the only people who could potentially allow it. However, in the last few weeks, government ministers have breathed a sigh of relief after Nicola Sturgeon, the First Minister of Scotland and Leader of the SNP, resigned citing burnout. Sturgeon was a major force in Scotland's campaign for independence and although she says the campaign for independence will continue, many feel that nobody would be able to push for it in the same way that Nicola Sturgeon could. Scotland is not the only nation within the UK facing problems – there have also been major problems in Northern Ireland.

From the 16<sup>th</sup> century to the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, the whole of Ireland was part of the British Empire. However, after multiple years of conflict a treaty was signed which meant that Southern Ireland became its own country, independent from the UK, but the northern counties of Ireland (now known as Northern Ireland) remained part of the United Kingdom. Prior to Brexit, both the Republic of Ireland and the UK were in the EU meaning that there never needed to be a border between Northern Ireland and Southern Ireland, however after Brexit, this changed and some checks on goods between Ireland and Northern Ireland led some to say a border existed, which is unacceptable to people in Ireland. There was also much outrage, particularly by the DUP (a major political party in NI) at the previous Northern Ireland trade deal made by Boris Johnson which meant many goods travelling to NI from the rest of the UK had to be checked. Since then, Rishi Sunak has created a new plan. The new plan means that goods travelling to NI from the rest of the UK, which are going to stay in NI, will go into the green lane which requires very little paperwork and no checks, but goods that are continuing onto Southern Ireland will have to go through a red lane where checks will have to happen. At the time of writing, the DUP is yet to decide whether to support the deal. However, Brexit is not the only problem people feel the UK is facing.

Britain is facing a major health crisis. The NHS was already struggling prior to the pandemic but the Covid-19 crisis has hugely aggravated it. There is a major shortage of nurses and doctors and much of the health staff that remain are going on strike as they feel that the Conservative government is not paying them enough. Additionally, many argue that the NHS is not receiving enough funding to pay for new equipment, with some senior tory MP's such as Sajid Javid suggesting that there should be a charge for GP appointments. However, many feel a lacking of funding from the government stems from our deep economic crisis.

The economy is in shambles. This is due to a multitude of different factors – some people believe Brexit has had major part in this as it made Britain a less stable place to invest and made buying/selling goods more expensive. Others feel that Liz Truss had a big impact on the state of our economy – her plans for our economy resulted in billions of pounds lost and the UK being seen as a less stable place for investment. Coronavirus also had a big impact on the economy, but other major countries in the G7 group of richest nations have also had to go through that same issue yet their economies continues to grow at a faster rate than the UK's – in fact the UK's economy is expected to shrink next year – the only G7 country to do so. All the factors above and more have led to a situation where many argue the UK is no longer the major player on the world stage that it once was.

The UK's economic prowess is under threat, the health service has fallen further behind other top countries, the nations are divided and the UK's world leading services are no longer what they used to be. Other political parties are suggesting fixes but as threats from the outside world continue to grow, is too late for real change to happen? Only time will tell.

# Italy shipwreck- Migrants killed off the coast off Calabria

Around 40 migrants were killed when their overloaded boat sank in the rough seas of southern Italy.

According to various sources, the vessel broke apart with over 100 people near Crotone. This meant that many bodies have been recovered from the nearby beach.

One of the cost guards has said "At the current time 80 people have been recovered alive, including some who managed to reach shore after sinking". However, they have also mentioned that "43 bodies have been found along the coastline (including a baby)"

We do not know where these people were travelling from, but according to local news outlets, the people on board were from Iraq, Syria, Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Somalia.

The vessel sank due to it crashing into rocks during rough weather. The Italian authorities have begun a search and rescue operation on land and at sea. Survivors are seen huddled under blankets and attended to by Red Cross workers.

The Italian prime minister has expressed deep sorrow for the incident and blamed the deaths of these people on human traffickers. Pope Francis has said he is praying for the dead, the missing and those who have survived.

Every year people have been fleeing conflict and poverty from Africa to Italy which means they must cross the Mediterranean Sea.

# Careers in Education

This week will be all about teaching and education. There are lots of jobs in education, and like I said previously about careers at sea, it isn't just about teaching information to children.

#### Striking

At the moment there are strikes being carried out by a certain union for education, and there are some teachers who are part of that union who work at Hayes School. There are multiple unions and teachers can be part of any group they wish (but obviously not more than one). Strikes are being held by the NEU, The National Education Union, because of working conditions and how much they are being paid. Also, teachers don't have to tell their employers if they are going on strike.

#### Variety of Occupations

As you know, teachers are part of the education sector. When having a job like this you would need something called a DBS. DBS stands for a Disclosure and Barring Service and is a licence that shows an adult is trusted to work with children in a safe way. Like I said it isn't just about teachers in schools, there are many more that are part of this sector. You can work for the DfE which is the Department for Education. You are a civil servant who works for the government and manages certain parts of the education system. You can work managing apprenticeships and how many people are on a certain one, or managing how many people are in mainstream schools and how many aren't in the UK.

#### Teaching Adults

In further education adults can go back to university or college to study. The teachers would be adults too but they would just be teaching more advanced things than schools do. You can be a careers advisor, this means teaching adults about new jobs that they can take on if they left or quit their job.

### **Cyclone Freddy**

Tropical Cyclone Freddy, one of the longestlasting systems in the southern hemisphere, has hit Madagascar with strong winds and high seas and now threatens Mozambique with dangerous and exceptional rainfall levels. Cyclone Freddy is expected to reform and pick up energy over the Mozambique



Channel. It is expected to make landfall in Mozambique as a severe tropical storm on the morning of Friday 24th, likely between Beira and Inhambane. Freddy developed on the 6th of February off the coast of north-west Australia and affected island nations, including Mauritius and La Réunion, during its long journey across the entire South Indian Ocean. This kind of super zonal track is very rare. At least 5 people sadly have died after a tropical cyclone battered Madagascar's east coast, with heavy rain and powerful winds tearing roofs off houses and triggering a storm surge. Now, Mozambican authorities are setting up shelters and preparing to evacuate people in high-risk areas as the south African country braces for the storm. Heavy rains have already caused flooding in some parts of the country and the authorities have said additional rain from the cyclone might affect up to 1.75 million people.

#### **Mystery of India's Lost Port**

The mystery of India's lost port of Muziris has captivated archaeologists for decades. Once at the heart of one of the world's most influential trading routes, and hailed by Roman author Pliney the Elder as 'the first emporium of India', Muziris was known for its rich selection of spices, gems, ivory and silk. However, in the 14th Century, the port disappeared without a trace – its location seemingly wiped from the map. Today, there is still fierce debate over Muziris'



true location, but there might be new archaeological evidence which finally provide an answer. Though the archaeologists cannot be certain, they, with some expositions and historians, believe they have located the site of Muziris.

- Motivation





# WORLD BOOK DAY

On Thursday 2 March it was World Book Day. World book day is a worldwide celebration of books and reading that is marked in over hundred countries around the world. This year's theme is 'your' world book day.

World book day was first created on 23 April 1995 by UNSECO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) but the first world book day in the UK and Ireland took place in 1997 to encourage people to discover the joy of reading for pleasure. Even though in the UK, we celebrated it on the first Thursday of March in other countries it is celebrated on the 23 of April because it is the anniversary of the birth or death of several prominent authors such as William Shakespeare and Cervantes. In fact, Shakespeare and Cervantes died on the same date (23 April 1616) but because at the time Spain used the Gregorian Calendar, but England used the Julian Calendar so Shakespeare actually died 10 dies after Cervantes.

In school there were a few things that took place to celebrate world book day throughout this week. One thing that happened was that there was a book sale in the library that the librarians and Year 10 Book club organized as well as a book quiz that was organized by Jacob Fenwick-Read in which there were two teams one from year 10 and another from year 9 who competed against each other in 4 rounds.
